In October of 2014, eighty nine year old Virginia VanBendegom received word that her her sons remains had been identified. Son James had been missing since February 1967. He was now coming home.

VETERANS DAY BURIAL IN HIS HOME TOWN

As the day began, the first wintery blast of winter was descending over Kenosha, Wisconsin. Heavy cold rains pounded the area and temperatures were dropping. But as the funeral procession got closer to the cemetery, the rains paused. Kenosha streets were lined with those wishing to pay their final respects to their native son. Hundreds of people, veterans and civilians, gathered graveside to pay their tribute. Flanked by her 3 surviving sons, family and friends, Jim's mother Virginia walked the final yards to her sons final resting place. It had been a 47 year wait





Jim VanBendegom

Jim VanBendegom died as a result of the costliest battle in Vietnam Red Warrior history. Over 30 men died at the hands of an NVA ambush in February 1967. Wounded and then captured by the enemy, along with 4 other Red Warriors, he was led into Cambodia, where he later died from his wounds.
